Welcome to the first Newsletter of the **Japan Society North West** – the successor Society to the UK Japan Society of the North West. While many of you have been loyal members of the former Society for many years, some of you are entirely new to the Society and for you a little bit of background to the Society may not go amiss.

The UK Japan Society of the North West was founded in 1996 to provide a regional forum for companies with business interests in Japan. The need and support for such a forum has steadily declined while interest in all aspects of Japanese culture has grown. The new Society, born out of the old, reflects this shift in interest towards culture and the individual and away from, but not to the exclusion of, corporate members whose participation and continued support we greatly value.

Thus in spring 2004 a small number of British and Japanese residents of the North West got together to form the **Japan Society North West**. We aim to provide a forum for the understanding and appreciation of Japan, its people, culture and language to all living in the region.

The official formation of the Society took place at its first General Meeting, held on 6th May at the New Samsi Restaurant in Manchester. At that meeting the Constitution of the Society was adopted and the following were appointed to the Committee:

Indeed it is unthinkable, given the history of the relationship between this region and Japan, that it should not! Through First Secretary Masaya Otsuka, the Embassy is providing promotional support at CF04 in Warrington in just a few days and is advising and facilitating in a number of ways to help the Society to grow. We are very grateful to the Embassy and Otsuka-san in particular.

Society's Events Programme

The Committee has been busy since 6th May putting together a varied programme of events: we hope that you will find several of interest to you. A full list of events currently being organised is in the enclosed Promotional Leaflet: full details will be sent to you well in advance of each event. Highlights this year undoubtedly include:

- An Aikido demonstration in September (date to be arranged) by the Komyokan Aikido Association in Birkenhead. Aikido is a system of self-defence in which the momentum and strength of the attacker is used against him. The teachings of Sokaku Takeda were systematised by Morihei Ueshiba into modern Aikido.
- A visit on October 23rd to Blackburn Museum & Art Gallery which holds a remarkable collection of Japanese artefacts, but especially woodblock prints, "ukiyo-e". As well as being able to view the items in the permanent exhibition, we will be taken behind the scenes for a private visit to see the large collection to which members of the public do not normally have access.

Regional Events

Most Japan-related events take place in London and the South East. Japan-related events in the North West are few and far between: even more reason for an active Japan Society in the region! We hope to keep you informed of Japan-related events that you can visit in the region. Unfortunately there is no single source of information about these – so even the Society has difficulty in getting information.
